


Old Dudes Who Said Some Stuff

Thomas "Don't Call Me Horrible" Hobbes



(1588-1679)

- ** "The life of man "is solitary, poor, nasty, brutish, and short."
- an example of a philosopher who preferred "the evils of absolute power" to "the evils of life in a society that did not contain such an authority."
- a psychological theory about the nature of people.
 According to this view, a person is by nature "selfish"
 and "egoistic."
- In order to have "a peaceful society," it is therefore required that the ruler have absolute control over it.


THE SOVEREIGN


- Whatever abuses arise from his possession of such power, the society will nevertheless remain a peaceful one-and hence the abuses of power are to be preferred to living in "chaos."
- Laws are effective, if, and only if, they are enforced. And the enforcing agency can do so only if it is granted absolute power.
- Since sovereignty is created by a "covenant," or "contract," the subject retains all those "natural rights" that can not be transferred by covenant. For instance, people always have liberty to defend their lives against the sovereign.

This guy

- humans are a social animal"
- * "state of nature" is one where humans are not wholly selfish or cooperative and own their own private property.
- the "law of nature" is that "no one ought to harm another in his life, health, liberty or possessions"
- So... if this is the natural world, the question becomes....

Keep it on Locke

- Humans will assault and maim each other
- Life is characterized by one person or group seeking absolute power over others. (creating a "state of war")
- When this occurs we are required to oppose them.
- Locke believes that Monarchy is an example of this.

Locked into it


- Locke's Social Contract
 - societally agreed upon law, not force, is the basis of govt
 - **♣ A gov't without law will be tyrannical** (this is the danger with the Hobbes view of a single ruler)
 - ▶ We give up our right to ourselves exact retribution for crimes in return for impartial justice backed by overwhelming force. We retain the right to life and liberty, and gain the right to just, impartial protection of our property
 - ♣ Locke emphasizes that the government is appointed by the people and is therefore "responsible to them". This means the people hold the authority in society.

Hobbes vs. Locke vs. You




Padlocke your door

- According to him, no government can justly take away a person's private property.
- This is because private property is, to a great extent, the fruit of a person's own labour.
- ♣ In a significant sense, part of the person is invested in his property (and to take it from him is tantamount to an assault upon his physical person.)

Rousseau What?




Jean Jacques Rousseau (1712-78)

Rousseau What?

- Rousseau believed that good government must have the freedom of all its citizens as its most fundamental objective.
- He believed that if society could be directly ruled by the wants of each individual person (not by representatives like in a democracy) then the mob rule would allow humans to find the best form of government.





Over my dead body

- → Hobbes and Rousseau (Jean) disagreed with Private Property rights.
- * "Property is a creation of society"
- Before society "there is no thine or mine"
- ◆ A man owns what he can hold by force; he has no "right" to anything

- What do you think these dangers are? How do they happen?


Run of the Mill

- Tyranny of the majority stifles the development of individualistic behaviour.
- Mill believed that freedom of speech was something never to be restricted. The cost of restricting rights is worse than any offensive opinion.



It's for the Millions

- Mill's harm principle states
 that a person can do
 whatever he wants as long as
 his actions do not harm
 others, and if they do harm
 others, society is able to
 prevent those actions
- Laws should not restrict the freedoms of individuals because of what *might* be



- Adam Smith (1727-1790)
- Believed in the guiding hand of the "Free Market"




Agent Smith

- Discusses:
 - the division of labor and free trade,
 - self-interest in exchange,
 - consumer sovereignty,
 - the limits on government intervention,
 - price, and the general structure of the market.

Smith was the first individual to advocate for laissez-faire in the market place. His ideas were based on a system of competition.

This One is for Marx

- Karl Marx (1815 1883)
- Thought that it was the material factors in society which determined the way we think.



Marx for Being Right

- No natural right
- Ruling class decides what is right
- History is merely a matter of who owns the means of production.



For all of history conflict is between those who own the means and those who do not. And since classes will never voluntarily relinquish power, **change can only come from revolution.**

Another Brick in the Wall

Alienation: Capitalist system workers work for others. No connection to work and thus himself.

Slaves for another social class.

Exploitation of workers: where does profit come from? How do you create more?


- Labour: man works

- The way you think is closely connected to the job you do.

Charles-Louis de Secondat, Baron de La Brède et de Montesquieu (Montesquieu)

Montesquieu saw two types of governmental power existing: the sovereign and the administrative.

The administrative powers were the executive, the legislative, and the judicial.

These should be separate from and dependent upon each other so that the influence of any one power would not be able to exceed that of the other two, either singly or in combination.

a political and economic theory of social organization that advocates that the means of production, distribution, and exchange should be owned or regulated by the government

Collectivist Economic System

Spectrum of Change

- Radical a person who advocates thorough or complete political or social reform
- Liberal open to new behavior or opinions and willing to discard traditional values.
- Moderate are open to changes, if necessary
- Conservative want to keep the status quo
 - Reactionary favor a return to the status quo, the previous political state of society, which they believe possessed characteristics (discipline, respect for authority, etc.) that are negatively absent from the contemporary status quo of a society.
